

The example set forward in scripture is of a dialogue with God about how things work out in our world. In the beginning of Luke 11 (verses 1-13), Jesus teaches his disciples about prayer and also gives them a sample of prayer. This sample prayer in verses 2-4, forms the basis of what we call the Lord's Prayer. In this prayer, we open ourselves to accept what God brings us in the ways of daily needs, we ask God to forgive us only in the same way we forgive others, and we ask for God's guidance throughout our days. We also praise God for who God is and ask for God's Kingdom to be fully established. There are both parts here in this prayer mentioned in the first paragraph.

Reading further in this passage opens up prayer to involve an active part both for God and us.

"So I say to you: Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives; the one who seeks finds; and to the one who knocks, the door will be opened." Luke 11:9-10 (NIV).

Ask, seek, and knock are powerful active terms. We are to ask of God in prayer. The scripture says when we ask we will receive. So we are to bring things to God in prayer. We are to seek out those things we are concerned about and then we will find them. There truly is an active seeking part of prayer that involves us coming again and again. We are to knock on those doors we find before us in the path to see if they open. They are not going to open without first knocking.

Just sitting back and waiting on God to display the journey in front of us is not our spiritual path. Working out our spiritual journey without God is wrong also. The spiritual journey is both parts: God giving, guiding, and opening; us asking,

seeking, and knocking.

May your spiritual journey be filled with God's activity and also your hard dedicated work in order to bring great growth for you and the faith community with which you are joined.


- ♦ Please contact Steve Taylor at 540 239 1578 if you or your church is interested in participating in the Mission trip to Honduras during November of 2017.

- ♦ Tremendous news—Austinville, First Baptist Pulaski and North Fork all called pastors during the month of June. God is moving in our midst and we thank Him for His many blessings.
- ♦ Wilford has narrowed his list to three candidates for the Director's position at RU. He plans to have the final candidate to introduce to us in late July. Will let you know as soon as we receive the timing of Wilford's visit. The BGAV will begin by paying the new persons full salary, thus giving them time to raise their portion of support. The Network has pledged at least \$300 per month support for the Radford position. At this time we are not sure exactly when our financial support will be required. Please continue praying for God to guide Wilford and his team.




