

When reading this verse, God asked me: "Are you just relying on all the old things you have learned or are you open to the new treasures I want to share with you?"

There are many things I have learned about God over the past thirty years in my relationship with God. Most days I stand strongly on the principles I have learned. I review favorite verses, continue spiritual practices that have helped me to grow, and spend each day seeking how God is working around me. If I am honest though, I coast in my relationship with God reviewing all the old treasures I have received from God.

This verse asks me to examine: what are my new treasures from God? Have I found the new treasures God has for me this month? Or did I miss them? It would bother me if I missed these new treasures because I was too busy. So once again I am looking for ways to slow down and seek to see God's work around me and in me. This means I am evaluating my daily habits and routines to find ways to live life more simply. All this will open opportunities for me to look more deeply at what is right in front of me. It will allow me to contemplate how God is present in each moment sharing new treasures with me.

I would like to encourage you to also look for the new

treasures God is sharing with you. It is great to have a firm foundation to stand on. Please do not forget though God wants to build on that foundation by bringing you new treasures.

Pastor-Church Relations Team Report October, 2023

The Pastor-Church Relations Team, along with staff continue to meet at two-week intervals as we study the book <u>How to Pray – a Simple Guide for</u> <u>Normal People</u> by Pete Grieg. We are preparing to facilitate this study and lead small groups as we explore this exciting book with the congregation during the Pastor's Sabbatical in the spring of 2024. We are learning a great deal and enjoying the development of a deeper walk with God through prayer.

After an anonymous church member challenged the congregation to match funds up to \$15,000.00, a letter was sent to WBC members explaining the matching funds for Pastor Tim's Sabbatical and the church's Renewal. The Estimated Budget Amount Form for the Pastor was submitted to the Stewardship Team reflecting no change in the Pastor's Salary.

Please pray for this team as we search for an Interim Pastor and plan for the Sabbatical period.

Dear Church Family,

On August 28, 2023, Pastor Tim received an email from the Lilly Endowment Clergy Renewal Program Team that our congregation was not selected for funding for the Sabbatical that Pastor Tim and DeAnne have planned in April 2024. This was a disappointment for the Pastor-Church Relations Team.

Not getting the grant meant only one door had closed. We all knew that God would work out the details and we continued to pray for God's will for our church. We all believed that God would make a way.

We did not have to wait very long until another door opened on September 28, 2023. An anonymous church member walked into the church office offering to establish a matching fund to cover the cost of the Sabbatical.

This church member is willing to match up to \$15,000 for every dollar that is given by church members. This means if you give \$10, the anonymous donor gives \$10. If you give \$100, the donor gives \$100, etc. The donor is matching the donations given by the other church members.

The anonymous church member also stipulated that the monetary gifts would be split between the church and the pastor...50% to the church and 50% to the pastor.

Please pray how God may ask you to contribute to this upcoming chapter in our community of faith.

Mark your contribution for the Sabbatical Fund. The anonymous donor also requests that any gifts to the church be made by November 30, 2023. Should you have any questions feel free to contact any member of the Pastor Relation-Church Team.



Intercession—what an amazing, wonderful, humbling, and powerful word that is a true expression of unconditional love.

In preparation for the time Pastor Tim will be on Sabbatical, the Pastor-Church Relations Team and Staff are studying the book "How to Pray: A Simple Guide for Normal People" by Pete Greig. In Pastor Tim's absence, the church will study this book, discuss, and participate in prayer together. Since my time with this study and in preparation, I have truly embraced intercessory prayer. I once used the words "prayer" and "intercession" interchangeably, but now I know that prayer, simply put, is talking with God. During prayer, we give God praise, ask God questions, lift our cares and burdens to Him, and seek His Will for our lives. Praying grows our understanding of and strengthens our relationship with God.

Intercession happens when we feel a deep burden for others and reach beyond ourselves and our needs in prayer for them. Pete Greig says, "While interceding, we can at times get indignant and move beyond saying a nice prayer to a place of spiritual contention." Some would call this spiritual warfare for the deliverance of others.

Intercession is valuable and can impact a hurting and dying world. We can stand in the gap on behalf of a person, group of people, cities, and even whole nations. We go to God and then continue to go to Him in prayer on behalf of others seeking God's Will for their lives.

We can see the intercessory prayer that Jesus prayed on the cross in Luke 23:34: "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do." Can you also see Jesus' powerful act of intercession when He died on the cross for our sins? And even now Romans 8:34b tells us.

"Christ Jesus who died—more than that, who was raised to life—is at the right hand of God and is also interceding for us." That makes me want to sing the Hallelujah Chorus! I also read in Romans 8:26-27, "In the same way, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us through wordless groans. And he who searches our hearts knows the mind of the Spirit, because **the Spirit intercedes for God's people** in accordance with the will of God."

Jesus and the Holy Spirit are interceding for us and we in turn need to boldly come before the throne of God interceding for others

Fill your boxes and bring them to the church during the week of November 13-20. We ask that you also pray for all the boxes, those who will distribute them, and those who will receive them.
